\$7,354/year for In-State Tuition at a 4-year NC Public College




\$10,375 for a Household's Average Annual Rent

Childcare Worker Crisis

Those who reside in NC want quality programs with skilled workers where their children are safe, nurtured, and learning.

HOWEVER...

- Workers can't afford to stay in the profession, earning an average of \$14/hour (post-pandemic)
- Childcare programs in turn, can't retain workers and struggle to keep classroom and their doors open
- Childcare market failure has heightened the State's labor shortage. NC has 55 available workers for every 100 jobs.


What's the Region Doing?


What's the Region Doing?

Employer Spotlight: Toyota

- Toyota's Battery Plant is partnering with Vivvi to provide on-site childcare to employees that accommodate all shifts.
- Details on the cost structure is still being determined.
- Vivvi is eager for their expansion into Liberty and is open to adjusting wages to remain competitive in the area.







What's the Region Doing?

New Model - EarlyEd FlexPlex

- Incubator with 6 licensed programs in 1 facility (12 children per provider)
- This model removes barriers of entry for aspiring childcare entrepreneurs
 - Opportunity to move programs outside of a provider's residence
 - Creates a supportive and holistic network of resources for providers

















What's PTRC Doing?

PTRDC Economic Development District - CEDS

- Expand local access to high-quality child care and early childhood education region-wide
- Provide technical assistance with grant applications targeting this issue
- Open to implementing new partnerships for change and addressing this barrier
