

Chairman Molly Leight welcomed the PTRC Board of Delegates and called the meeting to order at 12:00 p.m. She requested a moment of silence and then led the Board in the Pledge of Allegiance.

1. Focus on Members: Surry County, Chris Knopf, Surry County Manager

a. Mr. Knopf began by thanking the Board for the opportunity to give a presentation of Surry County. He then showed the Board two maps, which included current and historical boundaries (See below).



- b. He then spoke briefly on facts regarding population, tax rates, and more:
 - i. Population: 73,561
 - ii. Property Tax Rates:
 - 1. \$0.582, Surry County
 - 2. \$0.38, Dobson (County Seat)
 - 3. \$0.55, Elkin
 - 4. \$0.48, Mount Airy
 - 5. \$0.58, Pilot Mountain
 - iii. Labor Force: 32,292
 - iv. Unemployment Rate: 7.0%
 - v. Farm Income: \$276 Million (i.e. poultry, livestock, field crops, horticulture)
 - vi. Geography: Foothills

c. Education:

- i. Elkin City Schools: Two campuses, supported by a supplemental tax rate.
- ii. Mount Airy City Schools: Four campuses, supported by a supplemental tax rate.
- iii. Surry County Schools: 19 campuses, including the Surry Early College.
- Surry Community College: Campuses located in all four municipalities, NC Center for Viticulture and Enology.
- d. He then discussed the largest employers in 2013 compared to 2000. The top 2013 employers can be found below:

- f. He then spoke of the recent economic development successes, including the Pittsburg Glass Works in Elkin. Other successes include MVP Group (Elkin), Awesome Products (Mount Airy), Pilot Mountain Pride (Pilot Mountain), Wine Industry (Countywide), and Workforce Development Centers in Elkin and Pilot Mountain.
- g. He mentioned that there are plenty of things to do and visit in Surry County, including but not limited to:
 - i. 15 operating wineries
 - ii. Pilot Mountain State Park
 - iii. Blue Ridge Parkway
 - iv. Mayberry
 - v. Mitchell River Game Lands
 - vi. Horne Creek Living Historical Farm
 - vii. Quaint, vibrant downtowns in Mount Airy and Elkin
 - viii. Historic Rockford
 - ix. Paddling opportunities along one of four rivers
 - x. Festivals: Autumn Leaves, Yadkin Valley Wine, Budbreak, Hot Nights Hot Cars, Mayberry Days, Yadkin Valley Pumpkin
- h. He then spoke briefly about the Board of Commissioners and provided two websites (www.co.surry.nc.us and www.verysurry.com) to look at for more information.

2. NC Tomorrow: State Economic Development Strategy, Betty & Dave Huskins, NCRCA

- a. Mr. Dolge introduced Mr. and Ms. Huskins. They thanked the Board for their time and began speaking about the plan, which has been worked on for the last two years in cooperation with the Economic Development Administration (EDA) and the Department of Housing & Urban Development (HUD,) through the Department of Commerce's Community Assistance Division.
- b. They explained that in order to facilitate the development of a state-wide plan, the Association developed strategies around four broad goals:
 - Build on each Region's Competitive Advantages and Leverage the Marketplace
 - ii. Establish and maintain a robust Regional Infrastructure

- iii. Create Revitalized, Healthy and Vibrant Communities
- iv. Develop Talented and Innovative People
- c. She explained that the next steps will include an Implementation Plan for 2014-2015, which will position the Association as a Statewide Collaborative Network that facilitates and delivers a "suite of serves" to local governments across the state.
- d. This would develop and deliver training modules in areas such as:
 - i. Facilitation
 - ii. Conflict Management
 - iii. Customer Services
 - iv. Economic & Community Development
 - v. Water resources
- e. She then asked the Board if there were any questions there were none. Mr. Dolge reminded the Board that the Triad Tomorrow plan was approved in February and that is has been a healthy process. He noted that this local CEDS plan has allowed PTRC to move towards an EDD status.

3. Consent Agenda, Nate Hall, PTRC Vice Chairman

- a. Request for approval of June 18, 2014 Board of Delegates minutes
- b. Request for permission to receive NC Workforce Development Funding under contractual agreement between NW Piedmont Workforce Development Board & the NC Department of Commerce
- c. Request for authorization to apply for \$20,000 in funding from the City of Winston-Salem's Successful Outcomes After Release (SOAR)
- d. A motion was made by Mr. Dillard Burnette.
- e. The motion was seconded by Mr. Walter Marshall.
- f. The Consent Agenda items were approved.
- Action item: Request for authorization to enter into contract with Northwest Community
 Care Network for the period October 9, 2014 to October 8, 2015 to conduct assessments
 for people transitioning across care settings, Blair Barton-Percival, Area Agency on Aging
 Director
 - a. Mr. Barton-Percival began by reminding the Board that they had given approval to apply for this grant several months ago.
 - b. The Northwest Community Care Network (NCCN), a part of the Community Care Network of North Carolina, is the lead entity for a Community Care Transitions Program (CCTP) grant in our local area. The Area Agency on Aging and Aging Network is a partner in this initiative to help reduce readmissions to hospitals and have been working closely with the NCCN and other partners.
 - c. Due to the recognized expertise and experience of the Area Agency on Aging (AAA) with institutional and community based services, the Northwest Community Care Network request the continued involvement of the AAA in an expansion of this initiative to include Davie, Stokes, Wilkes, and Yadkin Counties beyond the existing Davidson, Forsyth, and Surry County initiative.
 - d. He explained that the request is for the AAA to accept referrals from hospitals in the four counties and connect the referral to local support services to create successful

transitions across care settings. The goal is to reduce emergency department and hospital utilizations within the NWCCN network. Per referral, a reimbursement of approximately \$49 will be awarded to PTRC AAA upon the completion of the CCTP Community Services Assessment form. The CCTP grant has been renewed for another year and this is our first full year of funding for this initiative.

- e. He summarized by stating that he was requesting authorization to enter into contract with Northwest Community Care Network for the period October 9, 2014 to October 8, 2015 to conduct assessments for people transitioning across care settings.
- f. A motion was made by Mr. Ernest Lankford.

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- g. The motion was seconded by Mr. Dillard Burnette.
- h. The request for authorization to enter into contract with Northwest Community Care Network for the period October 9, 2014 to October 8, 2015 to conduct assessments for people transitioning across care settings was approved.
- Request for authorization to enter into contract for \$90,000 with the NC Division of Aging and Adult Services for Local Contact Agency funding for the period of July 1, 2014 – June 30, 2015, Blair Barton-Percival, Area Agency on Aging Director
 - a. Mr. Barton-Percival explained that this was his first opportunity to bring this topic to the Board since notification of receiving the grant.
 - b. He explained that the PTRC AAA will continue to coordinate Local Contact Agency efforts in Region G for the second consecutive year. The PTRC individual works with the region's long-term care facility social workers to train them to perform transition work on behalf of their residents who wish to return to the community.
 - c. The Local Contact Agency Coordinator is implementing a training regimen for new and existing facility social work staff and community service providers. The training regimen is comprehensive and assists long-term care facility staff to connect patients with community agencies and other resources to allow for a seamless transition from an institutional setting to home.
 - d. The grant request includes reimbursing current providers functioning in the role of a Local Contact Agency up to \$100 per Quality of Life Survey as they continue to respond to inquiries and offer counselling services.
 - e. He summarized by stating that the PTRC AAA is request authorization to enter into contract for \$90,000 with the North Carolina Division of Aging and Adult Services for Local Contact Agency funding for the period July 1, 2014 June 30, 2015.
 - f. There being no questions, a motion was made by Mr. Don Truell.
 - g. The motion was seconded by Mr. Dillard Burnette.
 - h. The PTRC AAA request for authorization to enter into contract for \$90,000 with the North Carolina Division of Aging and Adult Services for Local Contact Agency funding for the period July 1, 2014 – June 30, 2015 was approved.
- 6. Piedmont Triad Regional Development Corporation Bylaws, Matthew Dolge, PTRC Executive Director
 - a. Mr. Dolge began explain that as discussed at the previous two Executive Committee meetings, the Piedmont Triad Development Corporation (PTDC) is a tax exempt non-

profit entity developed to encourage economic development activities in the region. It was reorganized in 2012 to serve the entire 12 county region encompassed by the Piedmont Triad Regional Council (PTRC). To this point its primary purpose has been the administration of the SBA 504 loan program. Due to slow economic conditions and very competitive interest rates this program has operated at a deficit for the past five years. The recent change in leadership for the loan program puts PTRC in position to reverse the negative impact on the PTRC budget, and use new connections to increase the loan portfolio.

- b. He explained that the latest revision to the bylaws (attached as a separate document) serve to restructure the PTRDC in order to service the possible enhancements to our economic development activities. The recommendation is that the board be seated as described in the bylaws. The corporations activities will be designed to foster economic development across the 12 county region by functioning as an EDD, and overseeing such other activities as are approved by the board.
- c. He noted that the Executive Committee did not approve the bylaws, but wanted to send them to the full Board for a closer look. He then went forward with this presentation:

- 4. 17 non-elected members approved by the PTRC Board including representation from the commercial lending, economic and community development, workforce boards, and education
- 5. Officers elected from Board annually
- 6. Staggered three year terms for Board members
- 7. Committee structure for specific programs
 - a. SBA 504 loan review committee
 - b. Economic Developers Committee
 - c. Workforce Committee
 - d. Piedmont Together Committee

- j. Mr. Dolge then opened the floor up for either action or discussion.
- k. Mr. Dan Pugh asked Mr. Dolge how he arrived at the number "17" for the nonelected members approved by the PTRC Board. Mr. Dolge responded that they would like to give every county a seat and leave room for extras. He mentioned that the Board would nominate and approve these members.
- I. Mr. Don Truell asked how often this Board would meet. Mr. Dolge responded that they would meet quarterly and also allow time for called meetings.
- m. There being no other questions, a motion was made by Mr. Darrell Frye.
- n. The motion was seconded by Mr. Jackie Morris.
- o. Request to approve the latest PTRDC Bylaws revision was approved.

There being no other business, the meeting was adjourned.
