Each year the Piedmont Triad Regional Council Area Agency on Aging (PTRC AAA) receives federal and state funds to support county programming for adults 60+ and their caregivers. Attached for your review and approval are funding allocations for the following programs:

- Home and Community Care Block Grant (HCCBG)
- Family Caregiver Support Program (FCSP)
- Legal Services

The Home and Community Care Block Grant funds are administered by the PTRC AAA and are allocated to our 12 counties based on the North Carolina Intrastate Funding Formula (IFF). The formula, which is shown below, is weighted based on population with each county receiving a base of \$60,000. Partners for HCCBG funds are recommended by County Planning Committees and contracts are with PTRC AAA and each county.

The PTRC would like to make the Board aware of the issue we are currently involved in with the Weatherization Program. We hope to gain more legal input that will lead to a recommended action by the Board.

Please reference pages 14-17 for more information.

Information Regarding Changes Resulting From the Weatherization Program's Interpretation of the New "Super Circular" Rules

The Weatherization Program has raised questions concerning our method of charging for the occupancy of the Kernersville Headquarters building. PTRC is charging occupancy charges based on the mortgage payments plus cost associated with the building (utilities, lawn care, janitorial, etc.).

The Weatherization program is refusing to pay based on these calculations, stating that we can only claim the amount of depreciation on the building.

At this time, our liability for the building is the principal of the loan divided by the life of the loan (15 years) – making our liability \$246,000 per year (\$3,690,000 / 15) plus interest (which they are agreeing to pay).

Using the formula they are insisting on, the only costs we can recoup is the depreciation: \$3,690,000 / 40 or \$92,250. This will give PTRC a shortfall of \$153,750 per year.

Our research to date has given us one option for adjusting these calculations. To adjust these charges, we must obtain information from our contractor for the costs associated with components of the building. We can segregate the building into the building shell, which would depreciate over 40 years, the building service systems (i.e., elevators, HVAC, plumbing systems, heating and cooling systems, parking lot, outdoor light fixtures, landscaping and irrigation) which would depreciate over 10 years and fixed equipment (i.e., cabling, flooring, etc.) which would depreciate over 5 years.

We have not obtained all of this information but we are hopeful that these adjustments will increase the allowable depreciation helping us absorb a portion of the \$153k difference for the first 11 years of the loan.

There will be a significant impact in year 12 of the mortgage at which time PTRC will have shortfall of approximately \$64k; after year 12 the shortfall becomes approximately \$210k per year for the remaining term of the loan. This is assuming we can validate that only about 30% of the costs are the "shell" of the building.

We are still researching options and have reached out to others for assistance.

I, Martin Kuehnemann, conducted a fiscal desktop monitoring of documentation substantiating your agency's charges relating to the NC Weatherization Program from July 1, 2014 through December 31, 2014. Also, as part of this process, I reviewed your agency's policies and procedures, latest financial statements and indirect cost rate. The purpose of this monitoring was to assess Piedmont Triad Regional Council's (PTRC) compliance with Title 10 Part 600, Title 10 Part 440, Title 2 Subtitle A-Chapter II-Part 200 regulations for the Weatherization Assistance Programs carried out by PTRC thus far for the fiscal year 2014-2015. A summary of my review is documented below.

All Findings require corrective action. Attached to this report is a corrective action worksheet for each Finding. The corrective action(s) for each finding should be placed in the appropriate section of the worksheet and returned for my review and acceptance as soon as possible, but not later than thirty (30) days from the date of this correspondence. The action plan must correct the root cause of the Finding to ensure no future recurrence. Also immediate action must be taken to appropriately address all Trends for Concern. However, it is not required that the corrective actions taken regarding Trends for Concern be reported to the North Carolina Weatherization Program. The follow-up action taken by the agency on the Trends for Concern will be reviewed during the next onsite assessment visit.

Review Findings

Finding 01:

Failure of the agency to allocate occupancy costs according to regulations. The main office building was purchased with the proceeds of a 15 year bond. PTRC charges occupancy costs by dividing the total bond payment consisting of interest and principal by square footage occupied by the programs. The regulations allow for interest to be charged as it is expensed with certain restrictions. However, the purchase price of the building is to be recouped by charging GAAP compliant depreciation. Consequently, the cost is to be recouped over 39 years, not 15. Also, since land does not depreciate, the cost of land is not recoverable. See Title 2 CFR §200.449 (Interest), and §200.436 (Depreciation). The misallocation of occupancy costs resulted in the NC Weatherization program to be over charged for floorspace in the amounts of \$3,821 for the fiscal year of 2013-2014, and \$7,103 for the period of July 1, 2014 to January 31, 2015.

Required Action:

Issue a check for \$10,924 to The NC Department of Energy and Natural Resources and correct all charges incurred since January 31, 2015. Change procedures to comply with the pertinent federal regulations.

Trends for Concern

PTRC direct charges some of their administrative salaries to programs. However, PTRC failed to charge a proportionate share of the other associated expenses directly to programs, which resulted in the indirect cost being higher than it should be. Since the NC Weatherization Program does not allow PTRC to charge more than a budgeted percentage for administration, and this amount is significantly smaller than the proportionate share for the program, this does not affect the NC Weatherization Program.

Steve,

I am attaching two options for redirecting CDBG funds so that western counties receive some benefit. Each of the proposals starts with a brief description of CDBG program and a summary of the disparity between allocations to the east and west. Supporting documents including a map are attached. The difference between the two proposals are substantial after that.

The first asks for a budget provision that will allow the western half of the state to receive direct allocations from the state for a percentage of the CDBG funds. The west will be split into two CDBG consortia to be governed by local elected officials. The consortia will make all decisions on grant awards and administer the program as sub-grantees. This proposal basically cuts the state out of the program and puts it in the hands of local officials

The second is much more modest. It simply asks that a budget provision be inserted that requires that CDBG-I funds be distributed regionally with the west receiving a proportional share of CDBG – I funds (by population) each year using the current programs. It will also require a study commission on CDBG programs with participation from local folks.

We want the first approach because we think that local leaders should have a say in what their communities need and how funds meant for their use should be spent. The concern is that such a clear departure may be more than Senator Apodaca will be comfortable with. We can't afford the status quo, so the second is our fallback position. Please consider these and choose the approach that you think the Senator may be open to. I trust your judgement on this and you certainly understand the problem.

I will call you to discuss the proposals.

In 2014 and 2015, 83% of CDBG Infrastructure Funds (\$54.4M) went to the Eastern Third of NC.

The Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) program is a 100% federally funded program, passed through the state, for small towns and counties to address critical and unmet community needs. Approximately \$40 million comes to North Carolina annually, of which at least 70% of the funds must benefit low to moderate income people.

The North Carolina General Assembly's 2013 legislative session instituted major changes in North Carolina's CDBG program. The funds were split between economic development funds at the Department of Commerce, and water and sewer funds at DENR. The impetus behind the change was the ineffective use of funds that existed, and reduced red tape and regulations. These changes, as instituted by state staff, have resulted in a devastating loss of funding for the western half of the state.

In 2014 and 2015, approximately \$66,000,000 in CDBG funding has been awarded to 31 projects in 21 counties. The geographic distribution of these grants has been disproportionally weighted to the East. The attached chart (Exhibit A) lists the awards and shows this disparity in the number of grants and dollars awarded. The attached map (Exhibit B) is a graphic representation of the data in the chart. It clearly shows that the eastern part of the state has received a significantly larger number of grants.

The Western half of the state contains 53.4% of the total eligible state population (this number does not include large metropolitan areas since they are excluded from this funding source) while the East reflects 46.6%. The DENR CDBG-I program awarded 83% (\$54,433,360) of \$65,546,890 to grantees in the East and 17% of that amount, or \$11,113,530, to those in the West. (See Exhibit C).

Again – 53% percent of the population is receiving 17% of the funds. These are funds for small towns and rural counties which help them compete economically and meet the basic needs of their residents.

We are certain that the legislators from the western counties did not intend for this disparity to exist when they changed this program. To rural leaders in the west, this is reminiscent of the way funds were distributed in the 1970's. The State Water Infrastructure Authority recently rejected a DENR staff proposal to allocate the CDBG funds regionally.

It is our hope that a budget provision will put our counties back on an even footing, and allow for more local input and control of projects of paramount importance to our citizens.

Our proposal is to modify the State method of distribution of CDBG funds by creating two CDBG Consortia out of the Western Regional Council boundaries to act as sub-grantees.

The "NC Piedmont CDBG Consortium" would consist of the Centralina Council of Governments and the Piedmont Triad Regional Council. These two regional councils have the two largest non-entitlement populations in the state. The "NC Mountain CDBG Consortium" includes the Southwestern Planning Commission, Land of Sky Regional Council, Isothermal Planning & Development Commission, High Country Council of Governments and the Western Piedmont Council of Governments.

These two CDBG Consortia would receive a proportional share of the state CDBG allocation based on population, currently 53.4%. They will be allowed to program that funding for any CDBG eligible use as approved by the local elected officials on each consortium board.

Funds would be proportionately distributed to each consortium based on the CDBG non-entitlement population of each area. The governing board of each consortium will consist of elected officials representing the small towns and counties eligible for the program. They will operate on the principle of local needs assessment, local decision making, and local control. The consortia will be managed according to the basic CDBG guidelines for sub-grantees on all areas of compliance and uses, with no additional regulations added by state agencies. Each consortium will be responsible for all areas of compliance with applicable federal regulations.


The CDBG Consortia would not be eligible for the remaining CDBG programs in Commerce and DENR because they will have their own allocations of the state CDBG funds. The CDBG Consortia will dedicate at least 20% of all funding to eligible Economic Development activities with the remainder being used for other CDBG eligible activities as determined by the governing consortium board.

This new method of allocation will become effective on October 1, 2015 the start of the new Federal Fiscal Year.
