Forsyth County is the recipient of the State of North Carolina Department of Transportation's Rural Operating Assistance Program (ROAP) funding for FY 2015-2016. Forsyth County received a total of \$62,575.00 funding for the Rural Operating Assistance Program (ROAP) and they are requesting to enter into an agreement with Piedmont Triad Regional Council's Workforce Development Board to provide transportation assistance for individuals enrolled with the Workforce Development Program and/or NCWorks Career Center. The NW Piedmont Workforce Development Board will utilize the funding by purchasing and distributing bus passes to assist with transportation needs for those participating in employment and training related activities.

RE: EPA Brownfields Assessment Coalition Grant Program Application

The PTRC Planning Department requests re-authorization to apply for up to \$500,000 in EPA Brownfields Assessment Coalition Program funding by October or November 2015. If our proposal is funded, approximately 88% of funds will flow through to participating communities and 12% will be used by PTRC for planning and administration. We will request your approval to contract with the US EPA if the project is funded.

A brownfield is any real property – the expansion, reuse or redevelopment of which – may be complicated by the presence or potential presence of environmental contamination. In October 2013, the Piedmont Triad Regional Council (PTRC) received a 3-year, \$600,000 EPA Brownfield Assessment Coalition Grant. Current program efforts are focused on identifying brownfield sites in coalition communities along the B-85/I-85 Corridor in Archdale, Greensboro, Jamestown, Lexington, Thomasville and Trinity – and the 3 Counties in which they are located – Davidson, Guilford and Randolph.

Our 2015 proposal will focus program efforts along the US52 Corridor in Mount Airy, Pilot Mountain, King, Tobaccoville, Rural Hall and Winston-Salem – and the 3 Counties in which they are located – Surry, Stokes and Forsyth. Top priority sites may receive funding for Phase I and II Environmental Site Assessments. Eligible sites with the greatest potential for redevelopment may also receive funding to conduct clean-up and re-use planning and assistance with the development of a Letter of Agreement with the NC Brownfields Program to remove liability from non-contributing prospective developers. Catalyst projects are intended to improve quality of life, increase tax base and create jobs while protecting public health and the environment. Emphasis will be given to areas posing the most risk to human health and the environment, yet with the most potential for redevelopment and reuse.

The Ask

The Piedmont Triad Regional Council (PTRC) is seeking municipal and county US52 Corridor Coalition Partners, to participate in a proposed 3-year, \$600,000 Environmental Protection Agency Brownfield Assessment Coalition Grant. The grant will enable PTRC to continue building a regional brownfields assessment and

redevelopment program for the Piedmont Triad, in partnership with its local government members, the NC Brownfields Program and EPA.

What's a Brownfield?

Any real property - the expansion, reuse or redevelopment of which - may be complicated by the presence or potential presence of environmental contamination.

The Purpose


The PTRC Brownfields Program facilitates the assessment and cleanup planning of idled or underused sites and provides

strategic investments to stimulate the redevelopment of mills, gas stations, vehicle repair facilities, dry cleaners, and other potential brownfield sites. Catalyst projects are intended to improve quality of life, increase tax base and create jobs while protecting public

health and the environment. Emphasis will be given to areas posing the most risk to human health and the environment, yet with the most potential for redevelopment and reuse.

The Process

Initial program efforts will be focused on identifying brownfield sites in communities along the US52 corridor in Mount Airy, Pilot Mountain, King, Tobaccoville, Rural Hall and Winston-Salem - and the 3 Counties in which they are located - Surry, Stokes and Forsyth. Top priority sites may be eligible to receive funding for Phase I and II Environmental Site Assessments. Sites with the greatest potential for redevelopment may also receive funding for assistance with clean-up and re-use planning, membership in the NC Brownfields Program, and the development of a Letter of Agreement with the NC Department of Environment and Natural Resources, to remove liability from noncontributing prospective developers.

Re: Monitoring Review

Dear Mr. Dolge:

On May 6, 2015, Ms. Diane Greer met with Ms. Robin Howell, Criminal Justice Department Director, Ms. Robin Shelton, Finance Director, and Ms. Anne Nance, Accounting Technician for a review of Project Re-Entry's financial files. Ms. Wanda Nichols met with Ms. Rebecca Sauter, Project Re-Entry Director, Mr. Michael Thomas, Project Re-Entry Coordinator, and Ms. Tonja Fultz, Employment Specialist for a site review of the program at the Goodwill office location. The following is a summary of the monitoring visit.

Project Re-Entry provides pre-release and post-release transitional services for exoffenders returning to Forsyth County after completing active prison sentences. The program helps ex-offenders rehabilitate and become successful members of the community, while promoting community safety. An assigned case manager conducts specific assessments, selects participants, provides case management and arranges clinical services.

Ms. Nichols discussed eligibility requirements of participants of the program with Ms. Sauter, and proper participant documentation. Eight (8) participant files were reviewed for compliance (D. Beasley, T. Boone, J. Chadwick, J. Elliott, R. Hunter, A. Jones, W. Meadows, and L. Sweatman). All files reviewed had satisfactory documentation of eligibility. Extensive documentation of services and follow-up to clients was found in each file reviewed. Periodic progress reports have been submitted to the City on a timely basis and indicate operation within proposed service levels.

The pre-visit review showed that Piedmont Triad Regional Council has submitted a total of three requests under the FY15 Project Re-Entry grant, totaling \$15,481.44, leaving a balance of \$2,018.56. Ms. Greer reviewed financial and grant management procedures with Ms. Howell, Ms. Shelton, and Ms. Nance and determined that they are acceptable. A printout of the general ledger for Project Re-Entry was obtained.

PTRC Garners 4 NADO Innovation Awards

For almost 30 years, the National Association of Development Organizations (NADO) has honored members who have made significant impacts on their regions through innovative projects that showcase creative approaches to regional community and economic development through their Innovation Awards Program. The PTRC is proud to announce that four of our projects were named Innovation Award Winners for 2015 – more than any other regional council or development organization in the nation.

NADO 2015 Innovation Award Winning Projects From The PTRC Include:

"CDBG Handbook" – The CDBG Handbook was developed by the PTRC in collaboration with the NC Department of Commerce, the NC Department of Environment and Natural Resources, the US Department of Housing and Urban Development, and local government partners to serve as a practical, user-friendly guide to community development block grant funding. The Handbook addresses in detail all CDBG regulations, translating them into laymen's terms for ease of understanding and use. It features best practices, checklists for implementation, and contact information for users to refer to for further assistance. The Handbook is now used throughout the State of NC to assist local governments and sub-grantees in the development, implementation, and administration of public facility infrastructure and economic development projects undertaken with state and federal CDBG funds.

"HOPE Crew Project" – The Northwest Piedmont Service Corps, a workforce development division of the PTRC, partnered with the National Trust for Historic Preservation as part of a HOPE (Hands-On Preservation Experience) Crew working to repair and preserve the Raleigh National Cemetery, a Civil War-era cemetery listed on the National Register of Historic Places and owned by the Department of Veteran's Affairs. As part of their work, PTRC Service Corps members repaired and restored panel sections of brick walls surrounding the cemetery. In all, they repaired almost 40,000 bricks – 8 ½ miles worth. Not only did Corps members gain valuable preservation and masonry skills, they also developed a deeper understanding and appreciation for their work site and what it represents. Corps Members said that they valued most was giving back – preserving the final resting place of so many veterans of prior generations and honoring their sacrifices.

"GIS Tool for Targeting Housing Rehab Programs" – PTRC GIS Specialists created this analytical tool for Housing and Weatherization Specialists to more effectively target income need and eligibility for housing rehab programs. This tool uses GIS technology to find and target specific neighborhoods with a high density of potentially eligible households. Through this technique, PTRC has been able to save money and resources by reducing advertising budgets, fuel costs, and drive times for site visits. The approval and evaluation process was also shortened, thus getting resources to eligible households faster.

"Survive, Thrive, Grow: Small Business Development Pilot Program" – In seeking new ways to expand work experience programs and to connect talent to businesses, the PTRC Workforce Development Division developed a model program in the Winston-Salem area to provide unemployed individuals and area college students opportunities for hands-on experience in technical or specialized skill areas such as non-profit management, e-commerce, software and web development, accounting, marketing and design, and even aviation technology at area small businesses. These small businesses often need the skills of these specialists to grow but aren't yet in a financial position to fully train them and hire them fulltime. With six local institutions of higher learning in Winston-Salem, there is a natural fit in connecting this intellectual talent with the needs of growing small businesses. In the past year, the program partnered with over 40 small businesses, matching those businesses with more than 60 participants with the specialized skills sets needed. The Workforce Development Department provided recruitment and screening services, background checks, etc. at no cost to small businesses participating. Worker wages for the first six months of the training period were paid with funding from the Workforce Investment Act. Coaching and mentoring for workers was provided by Workforce Development Staff. Partners in this initiative included the Winston-Salem Chamber of Commerce, Forsyth Tech Small Business Center, area business incubators, and private sector business development coaches. In many cases, at the end of the six month training period, the businesses were in a position to bring the individual on to their payroll.

The PTRC is proud to be nationally recognized for our continued accomplishments in regional development.
